COURSE DESCRIPTION

Serves as a bridge between GUST's program of English as a Foreign Language and its Freshman Composition I (ENGL 110) and carries academic credit. Facilitates students' entry into full university life by developing their high-intermediate level writing, reading, and critical thinking skills to the level required in GUST degree courses. Prerequisite: ENGL 098 or placement test.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

After successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Develop familiarity with various rhetorical patterns and genres;
- 2. Employ the various steps of the writing process, including planning, drafting, revising, and editing written work;
- 3. Produce unified and coherent essays with introduction, body and conclusion paragraphs;
- 4. Demonstrate grammar competence by writing clear, error-free essays;
- 5. Develop their reading skills through reading and comprehending texts of various lengths and genres.

REQUIRED TEXTBOOK AND SUPPLIES

- 1. MySkillsLab access code (In Concert, An Integrated Approach to Reading and Writing, 2/e).
- 2. As the course requires electronic submissions and the writing process is to be completed in-class, your personal computer and charger **MUST** be brought to each scheduled class. Mobile phones are not allowed to be used in the classroom. You should borrow a laptop for the class if yours is not working.

It is important to note that – while an ENGL 100 course grade of 60 (D) is passing – students must earn a course grade of 70 (C-) or higher to advance to ENGL 110.

Grades are posted in MyGUST. After each assignment grade has been posted to MyGUST, you have two days, 48 hours, to dispute the grade given to you. The 48 hours begins on the day the instructor posts marks in MyGUST for the graded papers. If you wish to dispute your grade, see your instructor

during her office hours. You must have a viable reason(s) for the instructor to change your grade. If you do not dispute your grade within the 48 hours, the posting of the grade is final and will not be changed.

BONUS CREDIT:

For each 30-minute tutoring session in the English Department's Writing Lab located on the first floor of the GUST Library, you will receive 0.5% extra credit per tutoring session if you stay the entire 30 minutes and if you work sincerely. You may receive tutoring with your writing assignments. To receive help with your writing assignments, you must bring a soft (electronic) copy of your rough draft on a flash memory as well as a hard (photocopy) copy of the rough draft. The English Department's Writing Lab is normally open from 9:30 a.m. until 2:30 p.m. in N2-103 on the first floor of the GUS Library. The maximum extra credit you can earn is 5%. Your participation must be documented on the Bonus Credit Form for English Dept Writing Lab Tutoring.

ACADEMIC HONESTY & PLAGIARISM:

The University Student Code of Conduct Rules on Academic Honesty defines cheating and plagiarism as follows:

- a. The term cheating includes, but is not limited to, (i) use of any unauthorized assistance in taking quizzes, tests, or examinations; (ii) dependence upon the aid of sources beyond those authorized by the instructor in writing papers, preparing reports, solving problems, or carrying out other assignments; (iii) acquisition or possession without permission of tests, or other academic material belonging to a member of the University faculty or staff; or (iv) knowingly providing any unauthorized assistance to another student on quizzes, tests, or examinations.
- b. The term plagiarism includes, but is not limited to:
 - use by paraphrase or direct quotation of the published or unpublished work of another person without fully and properly crediting the author with citations or bibliographical reference;
 - unacknowledged use of materials prepared by another person or agency engaged in the selling of term papers or other academic materials;
 - essays that have been produced through collaboration with others (spouses, parents, siblings, cousins or friends, etc.) other than the Writing Lab TAs;
 - use of your own work from other classes, as well as the using of your own work from the same class if you are repeating the class;
 - use of Google Translate = plagiarism as it is not using your own words.

Faculty will follow best practices established by the Department, including but not limited to submitting all written work to TURNITIN, to determine when Academic Honesty violations have occurred. Every assignment with a similarity index above 5% (excluding references and quoted material) will result in a score of zero (0).

In case the instructor suspects plagiarism or cheating that is not detected by TURNITIN, he or she may take the following steps in any order that is deemed appropriate:

- The instructor may ask the student to prove the authenticity of the work in any method that she or he deems suitable. If the student does not cooperate, declines to provide any proof, and delays the process of producing proof, the paper will automatically get a zero.
- The instructor may forward the essay to the Writing Coordinator who will set up an ad hoc committee with a minimum of two other writing instructors. The committee members will scrutinize the essay in question along with all the other evidence submitted by the instructor showing student's level of English and will reach a conclusion in max 1 or 2 days. The conclusion will be shared with the Coordinator, Instructor and the student.

ATTENDANCE

Attendance will be taken by swiping your GUST I.D. in every class. Students will be counted absent if they are more than 10 minutes late. **Students will be marked as absent if they leave the classroom**

before the end of the class and dismissal by the instructor or if they have their mobile visible during class or use the mobile during class.

*If you have LOST your ID or FORGOTTEN to take it with you, you will be marked ABSENT.

* If a student misses 9 hours of class time, the student will be dropped automatically from the course and an "FA" will be posted as a final grade.

You will need to provide documentation for your absence in the case of:

- 1) Hospital admission.
- 2) Death of a first degree relative.
- 3) Participation in sport tournaments representing Kuwait.
