COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course serves as a bridge between GUST's program of English as a Foreign Language and its Freshman Composition I (ENGL 110). Similar to ENG 110, it carries academic credit. As a bridge, it facilitates students' entry into full university life by developing their high-intermediate level writing, reading, research, citation, and critical thinking skills to the level required in GUST degree courses. ENGL 100 is a three-hour credit course that teaches students how to write an academic essay through multiple drafts. The process of writing the essay includes emphasis on development of a thesis statement and organization according to standard rhetorical patterns. Cohesion is emphasized, as is development of ideas, through various techniques of support. The main focus, however, is improving reading comprehension, vocabulary and writing skills so students will be prepared for the reading and composition skills necessary to advance to ENGL 110; thus, course skills are directed toward that outcome as well as improving essay writing abilities. Prerequisite: ENGL 098

LEARNING OUTCOMES

After successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Write 500-word essays using various rhetorical patterns (descriptive process and cause/effect);
2. Employ the various steps of the writing process, including planning, drafting, revising, and editing written work;
3. Produce unified and coherent essays with introduction, body and conclusion paragraphs;
4. Use observations, personal experiences and examples to support and develop a thesis;
5. Demonstrate grammar competence by writing clear, error-free essays;
6. Improve reading and vocabulary (lexile) levels by reading and responding to 40 articles in Achieve3000.
7. Pass the Accuplacer (native-speaker version) with a minimum score of 4 (out of 8) in essay writing.

COMPUTER PROGRAM

A computer-based reading and writing program, Achieve3000, is used in addition to a textbook to improve reading comprehension and writing skills. **NOTE: In this course, students use the Achieve3000 differentiated instruction computer program for reading and writing exercises.**

These exercises are required and represent 20% of your course grade. To make the process easier for students, 12 KD will be added to your fees by the Business Office for this program. This fee is NOT covered by your scholarship or sponsorship and is YOUR responsibility. As with all university fees, nonpayment will result in a block on your account. This fee can be paid in the Business Office or the Cashier any time before the end of the semester.

ASSESSMENT

Essays are 500 words in length and must be typed in the essay template in MyGUST. Guidelines for each essay, based on rhetorical pattern, can also be downloaded from MyGUST. **Students must maintain and submit a portfolio of rough and final drafts of all essays to Turnitin.com. Please note that I will not accept any essays that I have not seen you work on in class during each step of the writing process.**

ATTENDANCE

Attendance will be taken by swiping your GUST I.D. in every class. Students will be counted absent if they are more than 10 minutes late.
