Recent work in historical ecology has altered our understanding of how humans have shaped what is romantically called "virgin forest." In-text Citation General Guidelines

With **quotations**, you must provide author's name, year, and page number:

According to recent psychological research, "students favor homework over more strenuous activities" (Williams, 2005, p. 54).

With **paraphrase**, just the author's name and year:

According to recent psychological research, doing homework is considered preferable to sports (Williams, 2005).

When the **author is named in the sentence**, the reference with the year follows immediately after the name.

Research by Wegener and Petty (1994) supports the idea that pets are beneficial in treating depression and other illnesses.


When the **author** is **not named** in **the sentence**, the reference with the author's name and year are at end of sentence.

According to recent psychological research, doing homework is considered preferable to sports (Williams, 2005).




Reference Page Citation

To create an accurate APA citation on your reference page, you need to find a source for APA guidelines (see list below), determine what kind of source it is (i.e., book, journal article, magazine article, website, etc), and then pull the required information from your source and plug for the kind of source you are using and then pull the needed information from your source.



For example, here is the guideline for a single author book as corresponds to the example above:
